

The Edie Adams Prize for Excellence in Dementia Information and Support Literature – A collaboration between Active Voice and the University of St Andrews

Every year as part of the senior honours 'Psychosocial Impact of Dementia' module at the University of St Andrews students produce evidence-based handbooks as part of their main assessment. The handbooks contain information targeted at those living with a diagnosis of dementia, family members and professional caregivers. As part of this collaboration members of SDWG and NDCAN judged the top four handbooks and provided feedback relating to the layout, topic, information, accessibility and members views on recommendations of the handbook. This work aligns with the priorities of both groups including SDWG priorities of Dementia Support and Tackling Stigma and NDCAN priorities of: Carer Support and Influence & Inform Carers Policy & Practice.
